Yes. there is student mentoring system is available in the college which is named as Tutor ward System. This scheme is implemented in both UG and PG classes. Under this scheme, A tutor is provided to group of approximately 50 students. The main work of this tutor is to look after students academic and psychological well being. He also monitor class attendance and performance. Full time regular teacher is act as a mentor for UG, PG students. In the classes where there are huge number of students, more than one mentor is assigned for the purpose. These tutor/mentor are responsible for academic progress and psychological well being of their students. Some times there is a problem related to psychological thinking of students. Our mentors/tutor provide psychological counseling to these students with the help of psychology professors. In the next steps the mentors refer them for more professional/psychological counseling if required. In the beginning of each academic session, induction programme is organized by the College administration. In this programme mentor has been allotted to approximately 50 number of students. The mentor is responsible for keeping records of the mentee in a proper manner. During the induction programme students get acquainted with the institution, vision, mission and goal of the Institution, facilities available and regulation of the College. The mentors are also responsible to maintain the biographic records of students like their academic background and socioeconomic status along with record of students class attendance, performances and academic progress. This tutor/mentor ward system is working smoothly in the college.

2. Adoption of village With the view to make students aware of the problems of the society and to sensitize them towards community services village Thanoud, 15 kilometers away from district headquarter, has been adopted by the college. Initially a survey, based on various socioeconomic parameters, was conducted by the students of the Department of Sociology in four villages. The outcome of the survey shows that Thanoud, due to proximity with Durg city and industrial township of Bhilai, is facing many socioeconomic problems, particularly Ganja (Cannabis) and liquor intoxication amongst village youngsters. During the meeting with village Panchayat members it was found that this has become a huge, almost epidemic problem for the village. Keeping this in view, the college held a Gram Sabha, wherein this issue was discussed with the villagers, present there in a large number. They admitted that things are getting worse since almost a whole generation is being lost to Ganja and liquor addiction. A counseling programme was organized and the people were sensitized towards social, mental and behavioural repercussions and healthrelated illconsequences of Ganja and liquor. The faculty members persuaded the village people towards running the deaddiction drive in the village. The lady Sarpanch of the village, an alumnus of the college, played a major role in this endeavour, as she coordinated the whole affairs proficiently and enthusiastically. The College thereafter decided to adopt the village in 2015. An integrated programme, that addressed a number of societal issues prevalent in the village with focus on combating Ganja abuse and sensitization towards Sickle Cell Anaemia, was planned. During the meeting with village folk the problem of Sickle Cell Anaemia was discussed elaborately and tests were carried out to identify the persons affected with Sickling. Under the digital India campaign an interactive session with the students of local Government Higher Secondary School was organized by the students of the college in which the school students were given an exposure and practical training about the electronic filing of complaints to various government departments. The college students performed a skit to motivate rural students to use internet and smart phones for getting counseling, information about various government policies and plans. The school

students were also made aware of the career prospects and opportunities for further studies after passing out higher secondary examinations.
