

1.4 Whether there is any revision/update of regulation or syllabi, if yes, mention their salient aspects.

Reforms and Reframing of Curricula:

• A paper on Environmental Studies and Human Rights is included as Compulsory subject in the UG programme as per UGC guidelines.

• Anthropology can also be opted by both the students of Arts and Science. Similarly, Geology and Industrial Chemistry can be opted by the students of Mathematics and Biology groups at UG level.

• Combination of Economics with Mathematics and Geography along with Chemistry and Botany is under proposal.

• Credit Based Semester System (CBSS) is adopted at PG level. The syllabus is divided in 04 units with a credit distribution of 05 marks per unit.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes?

IQAC of the college plays vital role in implementing various measures for over all development of the students. Teaching, learning and evaluation are integral parts of any Higher Education Institution. IQAC of the college has taken the following steps in this connection -

- In the beginning of the academic year, a timetable and an academic calendar are prepared. - The IQAC of the college releases the performance index of the all the departments through Academic Audit yearly, which functions as a benchmark for ensuring quality in teaching and learning.
- Formal and informal feedback from all the stakeholders is received and analyzed assessing the need; specific measures are taken to reform and reconstruct the curriculum. The popularity and active participation of students in various programmes help in future designing of the curriculum.
- Workshops and seminars on quality education and sustenance are frequently organized in order to get exposure to the emerging trends and strategies for developing the curriculum.
- The department obtains feedback in informal ways from all the stakeholders periodically. IQAC also obtains feedback in a formal format once in a year from both UG and PG students. Informal feedback is also taken from subject experts, with industry personnel who provide valuable inputs for enriching the curriculum.

- A feedback format is designed and developed by College IQAC for students, parents and alumni respectively. The formats get filled and collected by a group of faculty members, an analysis report is made and communicated to the respective departments during meetings.
- There is a provision of Academic Audit in the college. Annual reports are submitted by the departments, which is evaluated by internal as well as external members of IQAC. An evaluative report with numerical markings and indicative measures are communicated to the departments and State govt. of Chhattisgarh by IQAC.




5.4 Details of student support mechanism for coaching for competitive examinations (If any)

- Induction/Orientation programmes conducted for first year graduation students to acclimatize them to college life and to facilitate smooth transition from school to college life.
- The Departments organize special invited lectures, interdisciplinary lectures and workshops. The aim is to build confidence and provide comprehensive and contemporary knowledge to students.
- The heads and faculty members also contribute by taking special classes to help students as per the need.
- Faculty members are constantly engaged in both academic and personal counseling of the students.
- The institution and all its stakeholders motivate students to participate in various cocurricular and extracurricular activities such as sports, cultural activities, NCC, NSS and Youth Red Cross to ensure all round development in students.
- Specific committees are formed to monitor the personal enhancement measures such as the Training and Placement Cell that keeps students informed about job opportunities, career identification and helps students find proper employment opportunities. Skill Development Scheme Committee has been established to ensure planned efforts at skill enhancement amongst students. Guidance and Counseling Cell as well as Grievance Redressal Cell are also in place to ensure a healthy academic environment, quality of life and well being in students.

- The institution also involves its Language lab, Commerce lab and Computer lab in soft skills development such as Language improvement, understanding financial aspects and transaction and making students technology savvy.
- Library Staff also contributes towards personal enhancement of students by providing them access to a well enriched library where books on general studies, magazines, newspapers are made available. Access to e-books and e- journals is also provided. A Reading room has also been provided and ICT facilities for students as well as research scholars have been upgraded to help them have access to comprehensive knowledge. There is Open Access Catalogue (OPAC) system in library.
- **Training and Placement Cell** has been established and monitors activities related to job notifications and opportunities, interview preparation, development of entrepreneurial skills, organizing of campus interviews besides ensuring maximum participation in campus recruitments and interviews. Training for Mock Interviews and Resume writing provided.

The college ensures transparency in its admission process by displaying the merit list based on the government norms and displaying the list of selected candidates on the notice board and website of the college. The admission process is conducted as per the university and government rules. It is purely based on merit. The score of the students in the +2 examinations is considered for their admission in the first year. The score of the university examination of the first and second year is taken into account for the admission for the second and third year respectively. The class-wise admission committees are formed every year, which work under the supervision of the Principal. In PG classes, admission is done through counselling and is based on merit. As far as admission in Ph.D programmes are concerned, it is mainly done through the entrance examination conducted by affiliating University that is Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur every year. From the current academic year online admission process has been adopted by the college at UG and PG level.

Best practices I – "ACADEMIC MENTORING OF SCHOOLS" (AMS)

- **2. Objectives of the practice :** An initiative introduced in the year 2011 with the following objectives:
- To promote collaborative engagements between the institution and neighborhood government schools. The networking aims at sharing knowledge and resources with such schools.
- Providing Institutional support and assistance in upgradation and modernization of facilities rendered by the schools and to bridge the gap between the standard of education delivered by higher education institutions and govt. schools.
- To facilitate sustained and active engagement with government schools dealing with poor infrastructure, shortage and quality of teachers and lack of ICT facilities.
- Providing intellectual and material support such as instruments, chemicals, glassware etc. as per the needs to these institutions.
- To help empower schools to deliver in accordance with fast changing requirements of the nation and society.

3. The Context:

The institute in accordance with the Kothari Committee recommendations of 1966 has been a staunch believer in the adage that "the destiny of the country is shaped in the classrooms and laboratories of schools". Recent times have been a witness to ever increasing concerns about the quality of education being delivered in government schools and the disconnection between school and higher education institutes. Also, over a period of time the institution was witnessing below par students seeking admissions to the college which drew its attention towards the need of urgent intervention in neighboring schools to help upgrade the standard of education being delivered to students.

1. The Practice:

Academic Mentoring of Schools (AMS) as a practice involves active involvement and engagement with schools. It includes providing mentorship to schools as per their requirements. The practice is aimed at networking with government schools that face various constraints which act as a hindrance in delivering quality education to students.

Introduced in the year 2011, the practice involves various departments at an individual level proactively approaching govt. schools in the district and making efforts at understanding the ground necessities of the school. At times schools also directly approach the institution for guidance and help. Detailed discussions and deliberations take place so as to gain clarity as to the nature of help sought and measures to be taken to provide the needful.

Since the introduction of this initiative the college has collaborated with schools for various purposes. Institutional support for infrastructure improvement be it strengthening of laboratories, ICT facilities and introduction of new and latest teaching learning equipments is being provided. A crucial area of concern that has specifically been looked into are measures at strengthening teacher support services in schools via mentoring and peer discussion sessions, training programmes, knowledge exchange programs and free of cost consultancy services to meet the present day requirements of their subjects. As such in the year 2014-15, Computer Science dept. conducted a two day workshop for school teachers at Govt. H.S.School, Deepak Nagar, Durg. Teacher training programmes were also conducted in 5 science departments under the STAR college scheme of DBT, GOI and similarly faculty members from the dept. of Physics, Chemistry, Biotechnology and Mathematics collaborated with the District School Education Authority in the year 2015-16 to provide consultancy services to school teachers for knowledge upgradation and improvement in teaching methodologies in Science. It may be noted that during 2011-2015 teacher recruitment drives for vacancies in schools, particularly remote villages were being conducted. Several students passing put from different streams have been joining as Shiksha Karmis in these schools .These students are in regular touch with their depts. and frequently seek guidance regarding lab setting, purchase of equipments, curriculum upgradation and so on. Faculty members are also extending their expertise as resource persons in various training programmes organized for school teachers.

Various guidance programmes targeting school students are also being conducted to help them develop a better understanding of their subjects. Dept. of Chemistry in the year 2011-12 conducted various activities for school students to celebrate 'The International Year of Chemistry' and in the year 2013-14 and 2014-15 conducted lectures for class XII students from Govt. H.S. School, Aheri, Sunshine H.S. School station Road, Durg and guided students at Govt. H.S. School, Deepak Nagar (a school adopted by our NGO, Jann Unnayan) regarding Inspire scholarship guidelines.

Awareness drives and lectures being conducted for the benefit of school students are also a regular aspect of this practice. In the year 2012-2013, 'DST sponsored entrepreneurship awareness camp' was held at Govt. H.S. School, Deepak Nagar, Durg by the Career and Placement Cell. Dept. of Biotechnology in the year 2013-14 and 2014-15 conducted Sickle Cell Anemia test and awareness drives at Govt. H.S. School, Khamariya and Govt. H.S. School, Khapri. Similarly, in the year 2014-15, the Dept. of Geology conducted lectures on rain water harvesting and Nepal earthquake disaster, while the Dept. of Microbiology conducted disease awareness camp for preventing prevailing diseases, targeting students from class IX to XII at Govt. H.S. School, Durg in the same year. Dept. of Physics in the year 2015-16 conducted an awareness drive on Digital India and links for online processes at Govt. H.S. School, Thanaud, a village adopted by the college. Also in the same year the Dept. of Zoology conducted an awareness camp for health and hygiene, blood group determination and nutrition in Govt. School, Potia Kala. While the Dept. of Psychology conducted lectures on Personality Development at the Govt. H.S. Girls and Boys school, Sailud, Patan, the Dept. of Botany helped students at Sunshine H.S. School understand practicals on plant physiology, anatomy and cell biology. The Dept. of Computer Science has also been engaged in conducting workshops for school children from time to time as such a seven and two day workshop was conducted for students of Govt. H.S. School, Deepak Nagar on basics of computer in the year 2013-14 and the year 2014-15. The college has also opened its Science laboratories to school students. The effort is aimed at popularizing science among school students who are fast losing interest in these relevant fields. Students on these visits get to interact with expert faculties who assist them in developing better insight and aptitude for science as a subject. Fifty students of Govt. H.S. School, Aheri, Dhamdha visited Chemistry lab and got acquainted with latest laboratory instruments being used in Chemistry in the year 2014-15.

A noteworthy endeavor by the Dept. of Mathematics has been the organizing of 'Regional Mathematical Olympiad' funded by the Chhattisgarh Council of Science and technology (CCOST) since 2010, a collaborative effort of the dept. with **Homi Bhabha Centre for Science Education** (HBCSE) and Tata Institute of Fundamental Research (TIFR) for popularizing Mathematics and enhancing numerical abilities amongst school students. The district coordinator of this event is a faculty member of the department. The competition involves participation by students from various schools in the district every year. Workshops for clearing these exams are also being conducted by the department.

The AMS practice thus has been driven by the spirit of fostering a culture of inquiry, thinking and creativity amongst both faculty and students of schools in the district. The endeavor aims at raising the standard of education being delivered hereby and in the process improving the quality of candidates seeking admission to higher education institutes.

4. Evidence of Success:

Over the years this effort at networking with schools has started producing gradual but favourable results. The foremost parameter of gauging this change has been the quality of students seeking admission to the institute that has shown a major improvement over time.

The outcome of our effort has been noticed viz, **Regional Mathematical Olympiad** have been regularly organized by the Department of Mathematics, which resulted in good success rate. In 2015-16, total 619 students were enrolled; among them in first step 36 and in second step 28 students have succeeded. In 204-15, total 429 students were enrolled, among them in first step 36 and in second step 29 were succeeded. In 2013-14, total 674 were enrolled, among them in first step 36 and in 2^{nd} step 24 were succeeded. Similarly in 12-13 total 330 students were enrolled, among them in first step 12 were succeeded.

The Sickle Cell Anemia testing and awareness camp in Govt. H.S. School, *Khamariya* and *Khapri* was another major mentionable feat with 2530 and 226 students being tested for such cases.

The college has also actively been seeking feedbacks from schools where such collaborations have taken place to ensure better and impactful future associations. There has been improvement in performance reported by the school staff for students who have attended lectures by resource persons and experts. Similarly an improvement has been reported in results of practical exams amongst students who have had the opportunity of lab visits and expert interactions and guidance. Increased awareness levels amongst students has also been reported by the school staff for issues raised and discussed amongst them via awareness drives and campaigns undertaken by various departments on specific issues of concern. Schools are also reporting increased interest in science subjects amongst students, an issue that has been given immense importance by the college.

Feedbacks received from schools have most importantly revealed enhanced proactive participation in discussions amongst students and rekindling of the spirit of enquiry amongst them post the initiation of such joint efforts.

5. Problems encountered and resources required:

As the college continues its efforts at such collaborations with schools in its vicinity it also realizes the necessity of addressing certain problems it has been facing.

The foremost issue is the time crunch and time scheduling involved in these activities. Apart from the hectic schedule of academics, research and other college activities, coordinating with schools as per their schedules and time constraints has had its share of difficulties. Certain relaxations and restricting overburdening of colleges involved in such efforts would be a necessary help in this direction.

Similarly, the resource crunch faced by colleges for such activities is an added pressure and acts as an obstacle to colleges pursuing such associations. Specific funds by govt. and other bodies would help cater to such efforts.

Also, it has been noticed that such efforts at networking with schools are severely restricted by ground realities such as distance from the college. Certain relaxations for faculties engaging in such efforts would go a long way in further strengthening these individual efforts being made by departments in this direction.

Finally, it needs to be mentioned that at times motivational level and attitude of cooperation from school administration has not been very encouraging and forthcoming. Govt. directives and advisories to schools can ensure much needed cooperation from schools.

BEST PRACTICE II –

"PROMOTION OF QUALITY CULTURE AMONGST COLLEGES" (PQCC)

3. Objectives:

Promotion of Quality Culture amongst colleges (PQCC) as an initiative was introduced with the following objectives:

- The desire to build a '**Knowledge Society**' around. The initiative aims at creating quality consciousness amongst colleges in the state.
- The College in recognition of its standing as the First 'A' grade college of the state felt its responsibility to guide institutions across the state in achieving similar standards.
- Being one of the oldest institution in the state and having had opportunities to be exposed to quality education across the country, the college felt obligated to pass on this invaluable treasure of accumulated knowledge to the colleges around.
- Being the lead college of the state and having worked closely with the State Quality Assurance Cell the college has had the opportunity to understand the urgent intervention required in colleges to enhance the quality of services being delivered.
- As the premiere college of the state the college also has realized the necessity of pooling of resources and sharing of information amongst colleges to help facilitate the sharing of expertise.

4. The Context:

As the world shrinks into a global village and market economies and social needs drive the education system, information dissemination and sharing of knowledge and expertise has become an urgent necessity amongst institutions. No institution can survive as an island segregated from others in present times. Thriving of a healthy upgraded education system requires resources and expertise.

Keeping in mind such fast paced changes in the requirements of Contemporary Education System the college has been closely associated with other colleges seeking advice, guidance and support to help them understand and introduce changes as per the needs of the hour. As an institution that prides itself with having experienced faculty and latest technology the college realizes its duty towards other colleges and HEIs and as such has been making efforts at reaching out to them.

Over a period of time the concept of vertical transfer of knowledge has gradually paved the way for horizontal movement of knowledge. In accordance, the college has been stepping out of its privileged comfort zone and is reaching out to other institutions in their pursuit of excellence and in developing a culture of quality consciousness amongst them.

5. The Practice:

Being the first 'A' Grade College in the State of Chhattisgarh and the lead College in the area, the College has been looked upon by other colleges in the state as an inspiration and mentor. Having had the honour and privilege of being a well recognized institute, the college has over a period of time developed a close association with other colleges through interactions with their administration and staff members. Discussions at various platforms have brought in an understanding and clarity as to the requirements of other institutes.

Being the **Nodal College of Durg district**, our College in coordination with the State Govt. has been assigned the responsibility to look into the administration and academic development of 55 govt. and private colleges in the district. Various outreach and extension measures aimed at quality enhancement and consultancy services are being provided for such purposes in these colleges.

The College in accordance with its motto of developing a 'Knowledge Society' around itself has consistently been organizing workshops and interactive sessions for other institutions. The Internal Quality Assessment Cell (IQAC) of the college has been at the forefront of these efforts. It frequently organizes meetings with other colleges as per directives from the Dept. of Higher education and as per requirements of Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA), a govt. endeavour aimed at improving higher education amongst colleges. The institute and its professors have been essaying an important role in ensuring the success of this mission.

The most appreciated initiative in this direction has been the 'Assessment and Accreditation consultancy' being provided for neighbouring colleges. Necessary consultancy services regarding NAAC parameters and preparation of Self Study Report (SSR) are being provided to various colleges. In the year 2012-15, around 68 Extension Lectures on NAAC parameters were delivered by IQAC members across these Colleges. The purpose was to remove ambiguity and help them develop clarity towards the accreditation process.

Various efforts at developing strategies and measures for implementation of quality education and quality culture within campuses have also been ensured through the formation of the '**District Quality Circle**' in the year 2012-13. The circle headed by the College meets at regular intervals to ensure mobilization of ideas amongst HEIs that include government-run colleges, grant-aided institutions and private colleges in Durg district. This initiative has also been appreciated by the Commissioner, Higher Education department, Govt. of Chhattisgarh.

2. Evidence of Success:

PQCC as a practice aimed at quality improvement has been recognized as a joint collaborative effort between the govt., lead college and all stakeholders concerned in the long run. Keeping up with this viewpoint, the college has been guiding various colleges across the state towards quality consciousness. Various efforts at enhancing awareness amongst colleges through lecturers and district quality circle meets have made quality enhancement the prime concern for every college. They have now realized the immediate need to get accredited and in the process move towards major institutional qualitative reforms.

The most relevant impact of this practice has been the introduction of a certain amount of discipline and organized functioning amongst colleges be it in terms of maintenance of records or standard of services being delivered. Benchmarking of Quality has become a priority and colleges from the most remote areas of the district have been reporting introduction of similar best practices that aim at qualitative improvements within the campus.

A citable impact of this practice has been the success in motivating and guiding colleges towards NAAC accreditations and assessments. As a result of these efforts, improvements have been witnessed in colleges with 118 colleges having submitted LOI as on 16th February 2016 **post the State level quality assessment cell (SLQAC)** as compared to 28 colleges before the assessment. Presently 20 institutions in the state with LOIs accepted are preparing themselves for external evaluation by the NAAC Peer team within the next few months. Similarly, the number of accredited colleges has risen to 74 in the year 2016 as compared to 21 before the SLQAC.

The most noteworthy achievement in this direction of enhanced quality consciousness has been the steady rise in colleges being awarded 'A' grades in the state. At present, the NAAC team has awarded 04 colleges in the state with this honour, an acknowledgement of the vast improvement on the parameters of quality being noticed in colleges across the state.

1. Problems encountered and resources required:

Though this initiative at quality enhancement amongst colleges has started displaying positive results but efforts at quality improvement by the college has had its share of problems. The most citable issue of concern has been the need for institutionalized reforms being sleeked from colleges. It is a well recognized fact that for any institute to develop a culture of change and quality the change has to be internalized rather than being imposed by an external agent. Extraneous motivation and encouragement is temporal while any permanent change requires inside out changes as such bridging this gap between what is and what ought to be has proven to be the biggest challenge for our college.

Closely linked to our efforts at challenging this inertia in colleges has been the understanding of myriad problems being faced by colleges at the grass root levels. Varied factors such as remote location, resource constraints, and quality of students admitted to the institute, exposure of colleges at various platforms, connectedness with other institutes, willingness of staff members to contribute with time and energy and leadership and governance cooperation all contribute in embedding a culture of quality consciousness within colleges. Each of the cited aspects has a crucial role in sustaining qualitative standards within an institute and the college has had to deal with such issues on multiple occasions.

These challenges being faced by the college in introducing qualitative reforms amongst colleges can be ably supported via directives and advisories by the govt. to colleges emphasizing upon strict measures at quality enhancement, rewards for colleges complying with quality standards and withdrawal of benefits on failing in compliance. The Nodal College also has to be additionally empowered by the government to further the cause and get utmost cooperation from the colleges in its vicinity.
