 Topic: The Great Balancing Act India's Journey's Through the New global disorder

 Speaker: Dr. Avichal Sharma (Assistant Professor, Christ University, Lavasa, Pune)

Summary: Dr. Sharma's lecture was highly relevant, exploring India's complex foreign policy and economic strategy in a multipolar "new global disorder." He discussed the challenges of navigating the US-China rivalry and the impact of geopolitical events. The central theme was India's pursuit of "strategic autonomy"—maintaining relationships with competing blocs like the Quad and BRICS. He also touched upon economic challenges, such as supply chain disruptions, and the opportunities for India to become a global manufacturing hub.

Prof. Shrivastava discussed concepts from texts like Kautilya's 'Arthashastra,' focusing on the balance between 'Artha' (wealth) and 'Dharma' (duty). She argued that these ancient ideas about ethical wealth creation, sustainable consumption, and trusteeship are incredibly relevant today. The lecture provided a strong argument for building a modern economy that is not just prosperous but also equitable and just.

He stressed the urgent need for massive investment in skills (Skill India Mission) and healthcare (Ayushman Bharat) to realize this potential.

Summary: This lecture was a foundational topic in Indian economics, focusing on the landmark Narasimham Committee (I & II) reforms. Prof. Goswami detailed the "before" picture of India's nationalized, inefficient banking sector. He then explained how these reforms transformed the industry by reducing SLR/CRR, introducing private sector banks, deregulating interest rates, and enforcing prudential norms for NPAs. He argued these reforms are the primary reason for the resilient banking system we see today.

The core of the talk was the significant shift from the Planning Commission (which allocated funds) to the NITI Aayog, which acts as a "think tank" to promote cooperative federalism and guide states.
